Permian Historical Society will gather at the Petroleum Museum in Midland for its spring meeting on 26 April 2003. An excellent program of papers is planned by Program Vice President **Todd Houck**. After lunch, a number of awards will be given to some of the finest people in the Permian Basin.

Dr. **J. Tillapaugh** will moderate the first part of the awards program when Honorary Life Membership Awards will be presented to eight members who have worked in various ways to preserve regional history—by writing history, by maintaining county museums, and by supporting Permian Historical Society over the long years. They are **Geniece Childress** of Crockett County, **Ann M. Clark**, formerly of Upton County, **Nancy McKinley** of Midland County, **Paul Patterson** of Crane County, **June Reid** of Martin County, **Mamie Shepperd** formerly of Ector County, **Noble H. Smith** of Culberson County, and **Charles Stroder** of Crane County. Three other members will be recognized for their devoted service to Permian Historical Society, although they are already life members. They are **Mary Prudie Brown** of Martin County, and **Bobbie Jean Klepper** of Ector County, and **Betty Orbeck** of Midland and Ector counties. All living charter members will be introduced, namely Dr. **James M. Day**, **Enid Holm**, **Betty Orbeck**, **Mamie Shepperd**, **Charles Stroder**, and **Vernon A. Vashbinder**.

Two long-time Permian Basin residents will receive Permian Pioneer Awards for their volunteer work in the religious, educational, cultural, recreational, and/or economic development of the region. Congratulations go to **Bob Deavenport** of Martin County and **Eileen Welch** of Midland County, who are the recipients.

Life in West Texas

When it comes to weather and water in West Texas, the only dependable thing is recurring cycles. Optimism is followed by dry crises. So, after 50 years of meeting challenges, the Colorado River Municipal Water District is confronted with conditions not unlike its beginning.

At the District's outset, the historic drought of the early 1950s was followed with confidence the water problem was solved for several years. Then there came another dry period in the early 1970s, one in the 1980s, and then one at the end of the twentieth century. It is a fact of life in West Texas, where evaporation can be 3.5 times as much as annual precipitation; one can never be at ease in Zion.

In 1999, rainfall in the service area was half the historical average, and this was a continuation of conditions existing in the last half of the last decade of the century.

Actually, during the last six years of the century, Lake J. B. Thomas received only 25 percent of average inflow, leaving it 96 percent empty; the E. V. Spence Reservoir had received only 38.8 percent inflow and was 85 percent empty. While Lake O. H. Ivie was 76.1 percent full, its inflow had been only 73.9 percent of average, and its comforting 422,000 acre-feet of storage was limited only by pipeline capacity to serve the system.

Criteria For Permian Historical Society Awards

Permian Academy of History is the highest award of merit and is given to one who has made outstanding contributions in the field of historical preservation or the development of historical resources of the Permian Basin. The recipient must be a resident of the Permian Basin and the work must be of area-wide significance.

Fellows of the Permian Historical Society is an award given to an individual who has published significant historical work concerning the Permian Basin. The author need not be a resident of the Permian Basin.

Permian Pioneers is an award given to an individual who has resided in the Permian Basin for fifty or more years and who has continuously worked for its religious, educational, cultural, recreational, or economic development.

Permian History Preservationist is an award given to one who has made substantial and outstanding historical contributions to the libraries, museums, and archival collections of the Permian Basin. The nominee need not be a resident of the Permian Basin.
